Historical Rise



The Islamic State of Iraq and Syria, is a Sunni, jihadist, extremist, and unrecognized state in the Middle East.

At the start, it was an al Qaeda splinter group. It's aim and ultimate goal is to create an Islamic state across Sunni areas of Iraq and in Syria. Main Actors

Leader of ISIS : Abu Bakr al-Baghdadi:

He earned a doctorate in Islamic studies from a university in Baghdad. Before he joined al Qaeda, he formed a militant group in the North of Iraqi capital and was detained by the U.S. for



four years. After two leaders of ISIS were killed in a joint U.S.-Iraqi operation, Abu Bakr al-Baghdadi became the leader.

Barack Obama

President Obama announced that the U.S. intends to launch air



strikes in Iraq, land more troops, and expand the U.S. intervention. The United States is also considering it's options to arm and train competing Syrian rebels who can help fight against ISIS and Syrian dictator Bashar al-Assad.

Nouri al-Maliki

As the president of Iraq, he had been rumored to be using his

office to exacerbate historic tensions between the country's Sunni minority and Shia majority. Also,



one of the reasons ISIS could take over so much territory is because many Sunni citizens in Iraq felt disenfranchised by Maliki. Many people agreed that regarding who to blame for the situation, it be him.

Grand Ayatollah Ali al-Sistani

The most revered Shia spiritual leader in Iraq, he warned that the rise of ISIS would be a



great danger in the future and that fighting against ISIS is everyone's re-

sponsibility. Under his influence, people are now willing to protect the holy shrines in cities such as Karbala and Najaf by arming themselves to fight ISIS.

Hassan Rouhani

As the president of Iran, the world's biggest Shia power, he had said that his country was prepared to help Maliki government combat ISIS. Right now, Iran had supplied arms and intelligence to Shia uprisings in countries such as Bahrain and Lebanon. To combat ISIS, the Iranian president had stated that he might be willing to work with the United States, Iran's long time nemesis.

Iraqi Kurds, President Masoud Barzani


The Iraqi Kurds had always been suffering under Saddam Hussein. While tensions between Sunnis and Shia have become increasingly violent, the Kurds, led by Masoud Barzani, have been operating a region in the North. And While ISIS's recent conquest of

Mosul and Tikrit has paralyzed the central Iraqi government in Baghdad, Kurdish fighters took advantage of the situation and reclaimed the oil-rich city of Kirkuk, which had been annexed by Saddam in the early 1990s.
